The earliest recorded mention of The Bahamas is 1492 when Christopher Columbus arrived at what is now San Salvador, taking slaves and killing native Indians. He left to continue his search for gold elsewhere.

1647 was the date of the earliest European settlement.

1666 saw English settlers establishing a colony in New Providence.

In 1713 pirates outnumbered families by 1,000 to 200.

The British government brought an end to the slave trade in 1802 but it was the 1830s before this became a reality.

The airfield used during World War II became Nassau's international airport. Today, it is vital for tourism which provides half the jobs in The Bahamas.

Self government was achieved in 1964 and full independence within the commonwealth, in 1973.

Bimini, the northernmost island, lies 52 miles off the Florida coast: Inagua, the island furthest south, is near Cuba and Haiti. The islands are mainly flat although Mount Alvernia, on Cat Island, is 206 feet high. The Andros Barrier Reef is the third longest in the world.

Today's Bahamian lifestyle and culture have been greatly influenced by the West Africans, who arrived as slaves, and the British, who colonised the islands. This gave The Bahamas their culinary variety and rich heritage of music, dance and the arts. Although The Bahamas is one of the most prosperous countries in the West Indies, there are also areas of deprivation.

In the islands which are more sparsely populated, women tend to have poorly paid domestic jobs in hotels and restaurants. Single parent families are common and mothers often struggle to support their families. There are also problems due to drug and alcohol dependency, HIV and Aids which can lead to neglect and child abuse.

Although tertiary education is possible in The Bahamas, many young people obtain scholarships to study elsewhere and do not return to the islands.

PREPARATION

A table, covered with a blue cloth, reminiscent of the Bahamian turquoise seas, is positioned at the front of the worship area. On the table place a bunch of brightly coloured flowers and a Bible, open at John 13.

Lively Caribbean music is played as the readers, dressed in brightly coloured fabrics (especially pink, yellow, turquoise and green) process to the front of the worship area, where they each lay a handful of seashells and/or flower petals, straw work or tropical fruit on the decorated table.

WELCOME

Leader The islands of The Bahamas welcome you. We, the women of the World Day of Prayer Committee of The Bahamas, invite you to this celebration.

Our early beginnings, 65 years ago, were linked to the Presbyterian Church of Scotland in the capital city of Nassau. Today, World Day of Prayer is celebrated by more than ten Christian denominations in most of our inhabited islands. Listen to the words of ninety-five year old Gertrude Burnside who was part of the service in 1950:

Gertrude We were all dressed in white as we walked to the Presbyterian Church on that Friday afternoon. Most of the women were the wives of the ministers, and I was invited by my minister's wife to attend.

Leader Today, dressed in the tropical colours of our sand, sea and sun, from Nassau to the Family Islands, the people of The Bahamas greet you and invite you to join us as we sing a hymn of praise.

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CALL TO WORSHIP

Leader Let us join together with the islands in our call to worship.

Voice 1 Creator God, from **Andros** Island and from every country, you have called us into this place to come and be washed in God's ever-flowing ocean of grace; to bask in the iridescent light of Christ's love and to be embraced by your Holy Spirit with the cooling trade-winds of transformation.

All **A place of beauty and refreshment where we gather in community and love.**

Voice 2 From **Eleuthera** and throughout the world, we are called into the kingdom of God. Let us worship together in unity!

All **A kingdom of radical love, joy and peace – here and now.**

Voice 3 From the island of **Exuma**, we are called into Christ's presence here on earth, diverse in substance yet one in Spirit.

All **We come as we are, O Lord. Purify our minds to worship you; cleanse our hands and feet so that we may serve you, and prepare our hearts that we may perfectly love you as we sing your praises.**

Voice 4 On the island of **Inagua** may we listen for your quiet call to personal discipleship and service.

Leader Let us pause for a moment of silence in the presence of the Lord.

Pause

PSALM OF PRAISE

Leader Let us join together in a psalm of praise with the islands of **Bimini, Albaco, Acklins, Grand Bahama, Long Island and Cat Island.**

Voice 1 Great creator of the heavens and the earth, who has breathed into us the breath of life, we are grateful for this precious gift. We stand in awe of your beauty, splendour and majesty, seen in the brightness of the sun, the beauty of our waters, the face of a baby, the laughter of a child and the smiling eyes of an elderly woman.

All **Our God, we give you praise.**

Voice 2 God of wonder, we look with pleasure at the spectrum of colour and intricate design in each flower, rainbow and glistening raindrop. Lord, your radical love is as consistent as the sun, your mercy is as boundless as the sands, and your grace surrounds us like the waters of the sea.

All **Our God, we give you praise.**

Voice 3 God of grace, we praise you for the healing medicine in the leaves of our plants. We exalt your name for every opportunity given to us to minister to the poor and to wash the feet of the weary.

All **Our God, we give you praise.**

Voice 4 God our saviour, you are our God and we exalt and praise your name for all the many ways you have journeyed with us and our ancestors over the centuries.

All **We praise you for the many ways you have cared for us.**

Voice 1 God our redeemer and liberator, you have broken the chains of tyranny, oppression and enslavement over hearts, minds and spirits.

All **Thank you for making us free!**

Voice 2 Jesus our brother, you are the lover of outcasts and friend of the poor, yet one with God. Crucified and risen, you are our prophet, priest and king.

All **Lord, we are amazed by you. How you love us! How deep and radical is your love. Therefore, let all the earth bow in awe and praise the name of the Lord!**

John 13: 1-17

Narrator Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end.

The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself.

Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him.

He came to Simon Peter:

Peter Lord, are you going to wash my feet?

Jesus You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand.

Peter You will never wash my feet.

Jesus Unless I wash you, you have no share with me.

Peter Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!

Jesus One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you.

Narrator For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said:

Jesus Not all of you are clean.

Narrator After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them,

Jesus Do you know what I have done to you?

You call me Teacher and Lord – and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet.

For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them.

If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Narrator This is the word of the Lord.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Leader Let us join with the islands in a prayer of confession.

Voice 3 From **Crooked Island**, Lord, we confess that we do not understand the depths, lengths and heights of your love. In our ignorance we try to direct it away from those we do not like, cannot love, or will not love.

All **Forgive us, Lord.**

Voice 4 Creative and creating God, your hands have sculpted these **Berry Islands** and you have fed us with the abundance of our fish and the richness of the land. Forgive us when we let our human need destroy the environment that we all, together with our visitors, should be responsible for preserving.

All **Keep us from destroying your wonderful creation.**

Voice 1 We, on **Ragged Island**, confess that at times we intentionally refuse to wash another's feet because they are different from our own. Open our eyes to those who are in need of a gentle touch, a listening ear, a word of comfort and a healing presence.

All **Lord, we are amazed by you. How you love us! How deep and radical is your love. Teach us how to be more like you and to model your all-embracing love and gracious hospitality to all your children. Amen.**

As this hymn is sung a woman carrying a bowl and towel walks slowly to the front and places them on the table. She then returns to her place.

Leader Jesus said: "Do you know what I have done to you? Do as I have done to you".
In the washing of the feet Jesus sets an example of radical love. That means love without borders, love that crosses over borders. And he demands the same from us.
Let us take a few moments to think of ways in which we might express this radical love.

Pause to give time for reflection (2 or 3 minutes)

Leader Now let us share our ideas with those sitting near us.

Pause (Allow 2 or 3 minutes for sharing)

Leader As we close this time of sharing let us bring our thoughts together by writing a word or phrase on our footsteps. What can I do to express such radical love?

Pause (The music from George Mulrain's song 'What I have done' may be played while people write on their paper footsteps. Allow 2 or 3 minutes for this)

Note: The 'footsteps' will be collected later at the same time as the offering

PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

(see notes on p18 for suggestions re 'action')

Leader: Lord Jesus Christ, we come before you in prayer, bringing the needs of all women before you. We especially remember those of this country and those of The Bahamas, praying that your blessings and the power of the Holy Spirit may be poured upon them.

All Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader We pray for projects in The Bahamas caring for the needs of vulnerable people.

Over-the-Hill

We remember those who, living in situations of poverty, struggle each day to support and care for themselves and their families. We pray for the women living 'Over-the-Hill' in the poorest part of Nassau. Lord, fill them with hope in the knowledge that you will provide according to their needs.
(Action: change 'poverty')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

Crisis Centre

We bring before you victims of domestic violence, abandonment and rape, who blame themselves for their mistreatment and are afraid to seek help. We intercede on behalf of our children who have been physically, sexually, verbally and emotionally abused. We especially remember those in our crisis centres. Calm their fears, Lord; provide assistance for them and bring healing and radical transformation to both victim and offender.
(Action: change 'domestic violence')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

Detention Centre

We pray for all refugees, migrant workers and illegal immigrants, who live with uncertainty and fear in the Detention Centre in New Providence Island. Disperse their fears, Lord, with your grace and grant them your assurance of peace, justice and fulfillment in their lives.
(Action: change 'migrant')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

PACE

We pray for all mothers and single parents, and especially remember the struggles of our teenage mothers at PACE, in Grand Bahama and New Providence. May they find the support they need to continue their high school education and to fulfill their dreams for their children. Help us to help them, Lord.
(Action: change 'teenage mothers')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

All Saints Camp

Lord, we bring before you those living with HIV and Aids in All Saints Camp in New Providence, those in hospital and those at home. We pray for prevention and timely intervention and that we may be a loving support to them.
(Action: change 'HIV and Aids')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

Cancer Care Centre

We remember those in our midst who are diagnosed with breast cancer in the Cancer Care Centre. We pray for continuing education, early detection and for cures to be found. We honour the lives of our much loved women and ask for strength for all cancer survivors.
(Action: change 'breast cancer')

All Lord, hear our prayer.

If wished, a local need/project may be inserted here with a similar 'action' taking place.

Leader Lord Jesus, help us to remember that we are all your children and are loved by you with a radical love. Let us follow in your footsteps and model your radical love.

SHARING THE PEACE

Leader Let us share the peace of Christ with our neighbours on either side.

OFFERING

Leader The offering will now be taken for the work of Women's World Day of Prayer and for projects run by Christian charities worldwide.
We also offer ourselves to God in the form of our radical love 'footsteps' which will be received at the same time.

PRAYER OF DEDICATION

Leader Gracious and ever-loving God, accept and bless all that we offer and help us to walk in the footsteps of your son, our saviour Jesus Christ, following his example of loving service to others.

NOTES TO HELP IN THE PREPARATION OF THE SERVICE

Preparing the worship area

Try to create a Bahamian atmosphere and a warm welcome as people enter the worship area – eg with bright, colourful displays using pictures, the Bahamian flag, artefacts suggesting island culture and flower arrangements.

Names of the islands mentioned in the service may be displayed around the room and cut-out 'footsteps' placed on the floor from the door to the front of the worship area. A small, foot-shaped piece of paper or card, should be given to each person as they enter.

Prayers of Intercession

Prepare a display board or similar, or have easily accessible posters/placards around the church, with the following words:

BLESSED, BLAMELESSS, ACCEPTED, NEVER ALONE, INCLUDED, CURED.

Using blu tack or something similar, cover these words with strips of paper on which is written:

POVERTY (to cover BLESSED), **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE** (to cover BLAMELESS), **MIGRANT** (to cover ACCEPTED), **TEENAGE MOTHERS** (to cover NEVER ALONE), **HIV AND AIDS** (to cover INCLUDED), **BREAST CANCER** (to cover CURED) If you wish to add a local project to this section, prepare a sign/poster and covering strip in a similar way.

Each speaker for The Bahamas projects says her part, then walks to the appropriate word and removes it, to reveal the word underneath, ie **Over-the-Hill** removes POVERTY to reveal BLESSED. She then returns to her place in the congregation.

The address

The Bahamas national committee did not include a formal address in their order of service and we felt that it would interrupt the flow of the service to add one. Instead we have followed their suggestion of quiet reflection and sharing – and of writing on 'footsteps' our responses to Jesus' radical love, as this is an integral part of the theme. You will need enough paper 'footsteps' for the congregation to be given one each and also a supply

of pens/pencils. These could be available for people to take, if needed, as they enter the building.

Dramatized reading

Be as creative as you like with the reading! It can simply be read using different voices or dramatized more fully, using bowl, towel etc as props.

Music

Music with a Bahamian feel is included on the music CD which is available from the WWDP office. The CD also includes hymns from the service, both sung by a choir and with accompaniment only.

Before and after the service

If you have PowerPoint, pictures from The Bahamas could be on a rolling slide show as people arrive (available on the Background CD-ROM from the office) – or Bahamian music could be playing.

Many places serve refreshments before or after the service. This is a lovely way to enjoy fellowship with people from different churches. Together in Prayer usually has several recipes from the writing country – why not try some of these out for people to enjoy with their tea or coffee?
